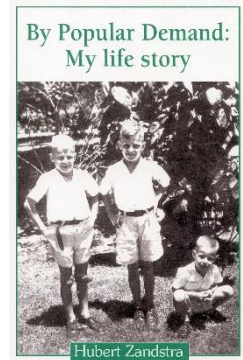


Hubert Zandstra
